

Fun Facts: Hispanic Heritage Month

In September of 1968, Congress authorized President Lyndon B. Johnson to proclaim National Hispanic Heritage Week observed during the week that included Sept. 15 and Sept. 16. In 1989, it was expanded to a monthlong celebration (Sept. 15-Oct. 15).

The start date is significant because it is the anniversary of independence of five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on Sept. 16 and Sept. 18, respectively.

Educational Attainment

For Hispanics 25 years and over, approximately...

- **7 out of 10** (74%) have a high school diploma or equivalent.
- **4 out of 10** (43%) have some college.
- **2 out of 10** (21%) have a bachelor's degree or higher.

Age Breakdown

Approximate percentage age distribution of Hispanics in the United States in 2021:

- **8%** - under 5 years of age
- **17%** - 5 to 14 years of age
- **16%** - 15 to 24 years of age
- **15%** - 25 to 34 years of age
- **26%** - 35 to 54 years of age
- **14%** - 55 to 74 years of age
- **3%** - 75 years and over

- **Ellen Ochoa** - Los Angeles City, California (Pop. - **3,849,297**)
The first Hispanic American woman astronaut to go to space with a nine-day mission.
- **Sonia Sotomayor** - Bronx County, New York (Pop. - **1,424,948**)
The first Hispanic American to sit on the Supreme Court.
- **Roberto Clemente** - Carolina Municipio, Puerto Rico (Pop. - **152,993**)
The first Hispanic American to win a World Series as a starting baseball player.
- **Selena** - Lake Jackson City, Texas (Pop. - **27,879**)
One of the most celebrated Mexican American entertainers.



Total Population of Hispanic Origin

About 62.6 million The Hispanic population of the United States in 2021 constitutes roughly **one out of five** (18.9%) of the nation's total population. The Hispanic population grew from 16.4% in 2010 to 18.9% in 2021, a 2.5 percentage-point increase.

Where They Live

Over half of the **62.6 million** Hispanics in the U.S. call themselves:

- Californians - **About 4 out of 10** (15,754,605).
- Texans - **About 4 out of 10** (11,857,401).
- Floridians - **About 3 out of 10** (5,830,908).

Spanish Speakers

Roughly 13% of all people 5 years and over speak Spanish in the United States.

Business Owners*

Approximately 6% or **347 thousand** businesses in the United States were Hispanic-owned in 2019.

The top three sectors for Hispanic-owned businesses were:

Roughly 16%

Construction. These businesses had a total of **376,070** employees.



About 13%

Accommodation and food services. These businesses had a total of **654,995** employees. (Includes restaurants and food services.)



Approximately 12%

Professional, scientific, and technical services. These businesses had a total of **206,757** employees. (Includes accounting, engineering, architectural, veterinary services.)
