Subject: Comments on the budget

Dear Members of the Board of Finance-

First, let me thank you for your dedication and time in developing a budget that is fair and takes into consideration the viewpoints of many. I have tried to take part in the zoom meetings to stay abreast of the proposed budgets, considered reductions, citizens' comments, and discussions about a potential increase. I recognize the difficult task that you've been given.

As someone who works closely with families and the school district, I would like to caution the Board from becoming too lean. The schools and town services are part of a safety net for families as much as any financial assistance program might be. Covid-19 has caused fear, hardship, and stress for so many. Let's not take away or strip back the very services and programs that support us.

Students will hopefully return to school in late August. It will be over 5 months since most of them will have been in formal schooling (or for all students if summer school is also canceled). I urge you to lessen the impact on our schools, administration, and teachers in recognition of the tremendous challenge that they will face in the fall due to the loss of learning and the lack of social-emotional supports for so many for so long.

I believe that the original proposed budgets were presented in good faith and did not contain unnecessary expenses; that the budgets were carefully crafted with goals and a vision for our community members in mind. Therefore, given these unprecedented times, I support a balanced use of "rainy day" funds *and* an increase of around 1-2%. I believe this would be a fair compromise and could produce a budget that is reasonable in the short term while still supporting our long term outcomes. I see our First Selectman, Superintendent, and most Board members working hard together to come up with a solution that meets the needs of everyone now and in the future. I deeply appreciate those efforts.

Thanks for your time and patience. I do appreciate the gravity of history upon you and the BOF.

On May 12, 2020, at 4:50 AM, Robert Tarlov <bofchair@colchesterct.gov> wrote:
Current collection rate is 98.8.

But I agree, the difference between 98.8 or 98.7 or 98.6 is not a lot on a 57,000,000 budget.

Non tax revenue is the difference between the 1st line and the bottom line, but the BOF has more discussions on the amounts initially assumed on this list.

Last Tuesday, Maggie presented mil rate increases based on current numbers and 3 assumed collection rates. Based on those numbers the change is between 2.05% and 2.25% increase in the mil, but we have more meetings to come that will continue our discussions on the two budgets and the revenue, so these are initial or interim numbers, they are not our present position.

Tonight we will be discussing the reserve accounts and Town budget, that discussion could continue to Thursday night. Next Tuesday we will be reviewing the school budget again. That could continue to Wednesday and/or Thursday night. The following week we have planned to hold the public hearings.

I was sent a chart I thought was presented for non-tax revenues.

As you know, the mil rate calculation is based on expenditure budgets, non-tax revenues to be assumed, collection rate. As none of these have been determined yet, we cannot publicize a mil rate at this time.

I would expect that we will have a proposed mil rate that will be presented at the Public Hearings which are in advance of the Public Comment period.

Looks like your numbers assume the budgets presented at the public hearing and not sure where you are pulling the non-tax revenue from.

We have not agreed on a collection rate yet. Your assumed collection rate was not one the amounts we had discussed, but we are still doing research on what other towns are doing.

Rob,

I developed a what if model to try and see the big picture. My understanding is all of the important pieces are public domain. The yellow highlight is not. Yet, in the grand scheme of things, their impact on the mill rate is not significant.

Assuming the math and public data is correct, based upon this model we're looking at a 5% mill rate increase give or take. We'd need about a \$2 million reduction in amount to be raised by taxes. If appropriations are held flat to this year, that would only be a \$ 1.5 million reduction.

I hope the official mill rate calculation is released well before the public comment period. It will help people give the BoF input. If this is way off base for known information let me know.
